Summary: I am the author of [*Rescue Board: The Untold Story of America's Efforts to Save the Jews of Europe*](#) (Doubleday, 2018), which won the National Jewish Book Award for excellence in writing based on archival research. My work was featured in the 2022 PBS documentary "[The U.S. and the Holocaust](#)," directed by Ken Burns, Lynn Novick, and Sarah Botstein, a film for which I served as a historical advisor and on-camera expert. My second book, [*Guests of the President: How 982 Holocaust Refugees Found Unlikely Hope in an American Town*](#), on the Fort Ontario Emergency Refugee Shelter (1944-1946), will be published by Simon and Schuster in April 2027.

I have been a historian, curator, and archivist at the US Holocaust Memorial Museum since 2003, writing and presenting frequently on behalf of the Museum. I served as the lead historian on the Museum's special exhibition, [Americans and the Holocaust](#). My work on the Hoecker album, a photograph album created by the final adjutant to the commandant of Auschwitz-Birkenau, has also been adapted into a theatrical production, [Here There are Blueberries](#). The play, written by Moisés Kaufman and Amanda Gronich and developed by the Tectonic Theater Project, will debut on Broadway in November 2026.

Work Experience:

I am the historian supporting the Education Initiatives department at the US Holocaust Memorial Museum, which is responsible for creating resources and professional development for secondary school teachers throughout the United States, often in cooperation with local and national Holocaust education centers and organizations. In this role, I review all educational material for this audience, create lesson plans and resources, present at local and national professional development conferences, and ensure the Museum's resources reflect current scholarship and meet the needs of educators. I am also the Museum's historian on American responses to the Holocaust. In this capacity, I frequently review social media posts, write articles for the Holocaust Encyclopedia, present on this topic to audiences at Museum fundraisers, and answer historical reference questions on behalf of the Museum. I also support the traveling

Americans and the Holocaust exhibition, which traveled to one hundred public and university libraries from 2021-2026 in partnership with the American Library Association.

Advisor, Florentine Films, 1/2020-9/2022

I was a historical advisor to Florentine Films as they were researching, writing, and creating the Emmy-winning three-part documentary film *The U.S. and the Holocaust*, which debuted on PBS in September 2022. In this capacity, I reviewed scripts, answered historical questions, advised on the creation of maps, and wrote materials to prepare the directors (Ken Burns, Lynn Novick, and Sarah Botstein) for interviews and film promotion. I also worked with PBS on selecting the key art, reviewed promotional materials and viewer discussion guides, and served as the historical advisor on the creation of the educational resources for PBS Learning Media. I served as a historian panelist for multiple promotional events sponsored by Bank of America, the film's corporate sponsor.

Historian, *Americans and the Holocaust* exhibition, US Holocaust Memorial Museum, 5/2015-9/2018

I served as the lead historian on the US Holocaust Memorial Museum's *Americans and the Holocaust* special exhibition (on display in Washington, DC, April 2018-present). In that role, I curated the web version of the exhibition; prepared research briefs; proposed curatorial approaches (such as the "refugee ships at sea" animation, which I conceived, researched, and drafted); vetted Museum texts, presentations, and social media; gave presentations on related topics; wrote articles for USHMM Holocaust Encyclopedia; and collaborated on teacher and docent training materials in advance of the exhibition's opening.

Archivist/Curator, United States Holocaust Memorial Museum: 8/2003—5/2015

I was responsible for incoming archival collections, working with donors, the legal donation paperwork, and the initial cataloging and organization of an average of 300 new collections each year. I also sought to bring the Museum's collections to the public by curating online exhibitions, social media content, and membership premiums (including the USHMM 2010, 2011, 2012 calendars) and speaking extensively about the Museum's collections at Museum public programs and fundraisers.
